AUDIT FINDINGS

NARRATIVE:

The PREA audit of the Marana Community Correctional Facility, a facility operated by the Management and Training Corporation (MTC), was conducted on March 11-13, 2014.

It is the mission of Management Training Corporation (MTC) to "Be a leader by: implementation of our plan to achieve high performance standards and goals; Maintaining a foundation based on integrity, accountability, and excellence; Providing long-term growth and stability while ensuring fiscal responsibility; creating opportunities through a positive environment for personal growth and development; empowering employees to implement innovative ideas for continuous improvement; Building esteem and pride by celebrating our diversity and accomplishments".

It is the mission of the Marana Community Correctional Facility to "House Arizona State inmates is a safe, humane, cost-efficient, and appropriately secure institution and to provide necessary and appropriate medical, dental, and mental health services to inmates by professional staff and to provide work and other self-improvement opportunities to assist offenders in becoming law-abiding citizens."

Introductions were made by the staff in attendance and the Auditor provided his background and discussed the PREA audit process.

After the entrance meeting, a tour of the facility was conducted by the auditor and members of the MCCF staff. Areas visited included the housing areas, program areas, medical, intake, food service, administrative areas, and recreational areas. Tuesday afternoon, the auditor began the interview process of random staff, specialized staff, management staff and inmates picked at random from the various housing units. A total of 44 were interviewed.

Facility Description

The Marana Community Correctional Facility (MCCF) is a minimum security prison operated by the Management & Training Corporation (MTC). The facility confines convicted male inmates from the Arizona Department of Corrections.

The 500 bed institution is located on a 25 acre site near the town of Marana, Arizona, and approximately 25 miles north-west of Tucson, Arizona. MCCF became operational in 1994 and was the first private prison to be awarded a contract by the State of Arizona Department of Corrections (ADC).

Inmate housing consists of two dormitory style housing units (Unit 1 and Unit 2) and 4 short term holding cells. Unit 1 has 4 pods of 25 beds per pod. Unit 2 has 6 pods with a total capacity of 400 beds. Each dorm unit provides basic furnishings, shower facilities, and the inmates can have TV sets if they purchase them. All showers and commodes at MCCF have panels, shower curtains and screens to enhance privacy.

The Correctional Officers provide security supervision which is supported by a very sophisticated camera system.

The security perimeter consists of one 16 foot woven wire fence with razor ribbon wire and electronic surveillance equipment. A Control Center monitors all traffic entering and exiting the facility. Numerous cameras control the perimeter and are placed throughout the facility to monitor the security and to open doors. The facility has two entry points, the front staff and visitor entrance and the rear wire gate for vehicles

The ancillary support structures provide spaces for administration, central control, visiting, food service, programs, education, medical, commissary, maintenance, laundry, recreation, and a Chapel.

The Educational Programs include Adult Basic Education (ABE), General Educational Development (GED), correspondence courses, and English as a Second Language. Vocational programs include Microsoft Office. In year 2013, the program reported very impressive certificate counts. There were a total of 2,725 certificates granted. These included:

Education- ABE 1 105, ESL 10, GED 67

Life Skills- Financial Peace University 129, Inside Out Dads 95.

Life Skill Education 549, Stress reduction 13.

Sub. Abuse Substance Education 1109, Substance Pre-release 78.

Vocational Employability/Work Maturity Skills 334, Microsoft 143,

and NCCER 93.

The educational program has been accreditated by the Correctional Educational Association.

The facility provides 27 different self-improvement programs for the inmate population. One of the programs is the Substance Abuse Program which provides treatment for 500 adult male inmates who have demonstrated a need for substance or alcohol abuse programming.

Work activity is a very important component of the MCCF program. It is designed to teach inmates employability skills and help them become accustomed to a work ethic. These programs include inmate work opportunities both inside the prison and outside of the prison on work details. Several outside work crews support the town of Marana, AZ, the Northwest Regional Airport, and AZ highway crews in landscaping, water department maintenance, and general maintenance. MCCF also has agreements with the AZ National Guard, AZ Correctional Industries and Eastern Style Builders to provide inmate work crews.

There are also recreational activities, religious, and social services available. MCCF has been accreditated by the American Correctional Association..

During the three day on-site audit, the auditor toured the facility, examined additional documentation, and conducted formal staff and inmate interviews. 10 inmates from the housing units, 21 specialized staff, 3 management staff, and 10 Correctional Officers were interviewed using the questions provided in the PREA audit documents.

The Pre-Audit document provided by the facility indicated no alleged issues with staff sexual harassment/abuse and no inmate on inmate sexual abuse. The interviewed inmates and staff indicated that the MCCF was a safe place to serve time and to work. There were no complaints from the inmate population or the staff,

In this auditor's opinion, MCCF was very well managed and the staff was well trained and professional in their assignments. The PREA Compliance Manager was very knowledgeable about the PREA requirements and was considered by the auditor to be outstanding in meeting the requirements of PREA.

The audit closeout was conducted on Thursday, March 13, 2014. Warden Casey, his executive staff and 27 MCCF staff attended. Also in attendance was Jeff Henry MTC Director of Corrections, Mark Lee, MTC Director of Corrections/MTC PREA Coordinator, Ed White, AZ DOC Facility Monitor, and Mike McCarville, AZ DOC PREA Coordinator. The auditor provided an overview of his findings and advised the group of the next steps in the PREA audit process.
