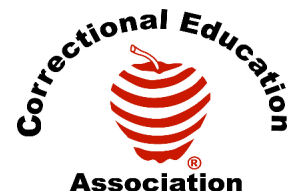
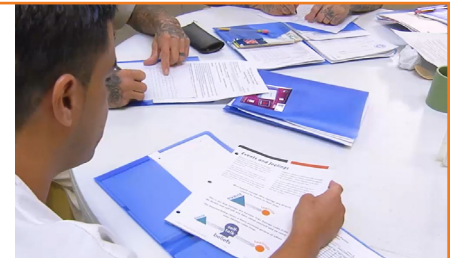
Resident Results
